

COURSE CONTENT

Through the study of a range of literary texts, A Level English Literature develops your critical reading and writing, your debating skills, and your ways of thinking about the world around you.

As well as analysing poetry, prose and drama texts, students are introduced to literary theories and look at the many different ways in which a text can be approached.

You will also delve deeper into the range of contexts that can have an impact on a text, exploring how societal and cultural concerns can shape how writers present their ideas.

Texts studied at A Level include *Nineteen Eighty-Four* by George Orwell, *The Handmaid's Tale* by Margaret Atwood, Shakespeare's *Twelfth Night* and Victorian literature including the poetry of Christina Rosetti and Ibsen's *A Dolls House*.

In Year 13 students are given a degree of freedom to explore their own literary interests in their comparative American Literature independent studies and close reading of contemporary poetry.

PREPARATION FOR STUDYING THIS SUBJECT

- Read the texts that we study and watch some film versions or television adaptations.
- Read widely, independently, a range of literature from a range of genres.

ASSESSMENT

- Y12: Internal examinations, preparing students for culminating A Level examination.
- Y13: Two written examinations, each worth 40% of the A Level; two pieces of written coursework worth 20% of the A Level.
